A Caveat (...or two)

Your DNA matches are presumed to be still living

Thus, this presentation will focus on methods rather than specific examples in order to protect their privacy

This presentation will cover one actual example but that person's identity has been "masked"

This presentation is focusing on GENEALOGY

How can identifying your matches improve your family tree? (e.g., not stalking or investigating people)

The Ultimate Goal....

Identify the DNA match in order to find the common ancestor and determine the exact relationship

For example,

Go from Name → "2nd cousin, once removed on common ancestor line"

Overall Steps

- 1. Identify the match

 This is what this presentation will address
- 2. Build a tree for the match (can not do this until match is identified)
- Extract direct ancestor surnames and enter into Notes fields for the match
- 4. Compare surnames with other shared matches' trees to begin to isolate possible common ancestors
- 5. Work a new family tree down from common ancestors to determine exact relationship to you You're finished!!


Get the Individual Clues from Different Sources and then Build on them — "Re-"search



As you get new pieces of the puzzle, go back and search again



My 4 Go To Tools to identify



Facebook: siblings, parents, maiden names Main Point: go back and forth between these tools once you get more information (for instance you'll get birth month/year from BV; go to Ancestry to get the birth day)

Ancestry: kit metadata, public records (birthdate, locations)

Google: obits, LinkedIn

Note: there are undoubtedly other tools as well but these are my 4 that I always try

Why Identify?

- 1) More context to determine if you should attempt to contact; for example, a close cousin who might be able to provide important information
- 2) Start a research tree ("Quick and Dirty Tree")
 - Use to determine how you are related to the person (i.e., work their ancestral tree back in time to find a common ancestor)
- 3) Add the person to your tree



Key to Identifying --- Build Clues

- Locations
- Age
- Surname
- Siblings, Parents, other relatives
- Birth Date
- Birth Location

Some Matches You'll Never Be Able to ID

No first or last name

My experience:

~10% can not be identified (initials only or very common name)

~10% can be partially identified (e.g., narrowed down to 2 brothers)

~80% are identifiable

Of course, YMMV (Your Mileage May Vary)

Examples of Difficult ID's – Common Names

 Not a lot you can do as far as searching for this person but don't forget to check shared matches before you give up

Very common name with no other details



David Smith

Seemingly Difficult ID's can be made with shared matches



Dna Test

3rd - 4th cousin

Shared DNA: 1.0% (68.7 cM)

HOWEVER--- I believe I have identified her based SOLELY on a combination of match strength (68.7 cMs) and match strength of other shared matches (MyHeritage has that very useful feature).

Shared Matches Can Reveal Clues

- All DNA testing companies have some sort of shared match information
- MyHeritage and 23andMe have additional benefit of showing match strength (cMs) between shared matches



Example of a MyHeritage DNA Match with Close Shared Match


 This match, 798.1 cM indicates that the two shared matches are very closely related



For Aliases --- Be sure to search for them on the web

- Some people love to use aliases
 - Often they will reuse those aliases across different types of accounts
 - When you see an alias be sure to search for it (e.g., try Google)






For Kits Managed by Administrators

 In Ancestry kits identified only by initials are typically kits managed by someone else, often a family member

Sometimes that can be a useful hint as to the surname.



In this case I was able to determine the surname of this match by using the name of the test administrator in combination with other shared matches.





Use BeenVerified or Other People Search Sites

- Has been invaluable in identifying:
 - Birth dates (Month + Year)
 - Siblings
 - Maiden Names (shows other names)
 - Locations
 - Relationships (especially likely parents)






Don't Forget to Document

 In Ancestry, once I've ID'ed a match I always enter the information into the note field



The Value of Documenting the Notes

- I always fill the Notes field (at least for all 20+ cMs matches)
- Easily view surnames from their trees to compare and look for commonalities
- See confirmed matches to help associate what the common line(s) are



Put the Puzzle Pieces Together

- Small Pieces
 - Location
 - Birth date (going from just year to year-month to year-month-day)
 - Birth location
 - Relatives
 - Can allow putting the puzzle together!



You can do it too!

One Final Note About Contacting


- Don't try to contact the person until you've completed a thorough search for records and identification
- If you do attempt contact, put a few clues in the message to pique the person's interest (e.g., mention surnames from the suspected line)
- Whatever you do, don't:
 - Overwhelm with facts (e.g., chromosome matches, centiMorgans, etc.)
 - Add insensitive remarks before establishing good communications
 - "I believe you're the sister of my birth father"
 - "Are you adopted?"
- REMEMBER: you want this person to respond so be as respectful as possible, adding a few clues to get them interested without overwhelming them.

It looks like we may be related on my Spencer-Cummings line out of Michigan. My 3rd greatgrandfather was Nathan Gould Spencer who lived in Eaton Rapids, MI




Real Example

- From my Mom's DNA kit
- New match: real first name, real last name [I'm abbreviating to LD for privacy]
- 30 cMs




- Check the metadata on Ancestry for the kit owner (click on kit name)
 - Most of the time this won't show anything but for about 10% you can find some valuable information
 - In this case I got a city name and an age group (very useful---especially for common names)



- Unlinked tree:
 - 7 entries (out to grandparents)
 - 3 private (presumably due to Ancestry indicating they are living) but all 4 grandparents are shown
 - Grandparent names are a *GREAT* advantage




- Shared matches indicate obvious connection to my maternal grandmother's New England heritage, especially New York
 - This is deduced by the other trees often showing common heritage to a couple of counties in NY
- I quickly "tag" the match as from my maternal Mom's maternal grandmother side



- Search the name in BeenVerified
- Yields her maiden name (under Aliases)
- Yields birth month, year
- Yields location, in NY



- BeenVerified, under "Relatives" I find:
 - Father (with birth month/year)
 - Deceased brother (birth and death month/year)


- Back to Ancestry, let's find the exact birth date (we already have month/year from BeenVerified)
- Often easily found in public records

Why is this important??

Increases the chances of getting more source hints in the family tree




- Always check Facebook
- In this case I did not find her
 - If I was more persistent I could very likely find her siblings or children from the BeenVerified results of Relatives

Oh my!!! I've never used this people search site before but it came up with a trove of information on my DNA match---much more than I needed, really



• Full name



• Birth date (day, month, year)



Location



• Parent's names and birth





Next Step: build a tree

After Identification....Build a Tree!

- New tree on Ancestry
- Be sure to set to Private and Unsearchable







After about an hour's work....


- Remember: this is a "quick and dirty" tree
- For this tree:
 - Ancestors as far back as 1600s
 - Over 300 direct ancestors



Capture surnames from tree

 Go back to Shared Matches list where you can see all the other Notes that were entered for each match and look for any matching surnames

 Matching surnames are a great clue to be able to isolate who the common ancestors are



There were so many surnames to annotate that I ran out of character space in Ancestry's notes field!
